## CHERRY VALLEY AND ROCHDALE WATER DISTRICT'S 103rd ANNUAL REPORT PERIOD ENDING JUNE 30, 2013

To the people of the Cherry Valley and Rochdale Water District:

Greetings:

Your Board of Water Commissioners respectfully submits their 103rd Annual Report for fiscal year ending June 30, 2013.

The Board would like to first and foremost recognize Assistant Treasurer and Bookkeeper Andrea M. Foley, for her 20 years of service to the District. Andrea notified the Board that she will retire effective July 31, 2013. The Water Commissioners realize they have a huge task ahead in selecting an individual to fill Andrea's position. She will be forever remembered for the dedicated and professional manner in which she performed her daily duties as well as respected by her coworkers, outside vendors and financial professionals. Needless to say she will be missed by the Board and staff. We all wish her a happy and enjoyable retirement full of free time spent with her cherished grandchildren, family and friends.

# March 2012 Special District Meeting

On March 15, 2012, the Water Commissioners held a Public Informational Meeting detailing the tasks to bring the District into compliance with the aforementioned drinking water regulations, the associated costs and the projected 130% increase in the water rates over the next ten years. On March 22, 2012, a Special District Meeting was held and the voters approved the 3.5 million dollar improvement program to enable the District to meet the compliance requirements of the MassDEP issued Administrative Consent Order.

# June 1, 2013 Water Rate Increase

The Board of Water Commissioners implemented the first year of a ten year water rate increase program. In 2013 water rates will increase by 30%. The ten year rate increase was presented in detail at the March 15, 2012 Public Informational Meeting.

# MassDEP Administrative Consent Order (ACO)

It is without question that compliance with the provisions of the March 2012 MassDEP issued Administrative Consent Order has been the number one priority of the Board of Water Commissioners. The Board, with assistance from Paul Howard and Shira McWaters of Tata and Howard and Superintendent Knox were successful in securing two funding sources to assist in the payment of these mandated projects. The first, is from the Massachusetts Water Pollution Abatement Trust, a low interest Loan in the amount of \$ 556,038.00. The second being from USDA-RD, a low interest Loan in the amount of \$2,247,000.00 and a Grant in the amount of \$700,000.00. The two funding sources will prove extremely beneficial to aid the District moving forward with the costly ACO projects.

Ongoing ACO Tasks to date include:

January 1-March 31, 2013: District Operators continue to track and record chlorine residuals at Total Coliform sites on a weekly basis, and conduct daily Slow Sand Filter Monitoring as directed by MassDEP and submit results to MassDEP by the 10<sup>th</sup> day of each month.

January 30, 2013: Advertise for Bids for the Construction of Media Replacement (Grindstone Well) and Resanding of Slow Sand Filter No. 2 (Henshaw Pond), Contract No. 1, DWSRF No. 3691 in the Central Register and the Worcester Telegram and Gazette.

February 4, 2013: Representatives from CVRWD and the City of Worcester meet to discuss the development of an agreement that would provide CVRWD with options to purchase water from the City of Worcester. The discussions were very positive providing options for the purchase of water to address CVRWD water emergencies as well as the purchase of water to provide permanent and continuous water supply for all District users.

February 11-15, 2013: Blueleaf Water, Inc. mobilized to begin the construction of the slow sand filters to be used for the Pilot Study.

February 13, 2013: Representatives from CVRWD, Tata & Howard, Inc. and Blueleaf Water, Inc. meet with MassDEP staff to review and discuss the Pilot Test Proposal and the Revised ACO schedule. Tata & Howard and Blueleaf submit revisions to the Pilot Test Proposal to MassDEP for review and action.

February 14, 2013: Receive and open Bids for the Construction of Media Replacement (Grindstone Well) and Resanding of Slow Sand Filter No. 2 (Henshaw Pond), Contract No. 1, DWSRF No. 3691. CVRWD received a total of four bids. RH White Construction Co., Inc. was the low bidder at \$237,465.00.

February 20, 2013: Tata & Howard submits revised Pilot Test Proposal and revised ACO to MassDEP for review and action.

February 28, 2013: Initiate the review of existing CVRWD policies and procedures as they may pertain to the Capacity Assessment Report.

March 6, 2013: CVRWD meets with USDA-RD Area Specialist Steven Bonavita to execute the Letter of Commitment enabling the District to qualify for the USDA-RD Loan/Grant program to fund the anticipated upgrades to the water treatment facility. The District will qualifies for a low interest loan in the amount of \$2,247,000.00 and a grant in the amount of \$700,000.00. Final approval will be contingent upon the results of the Pilot Study and Design of the selected upgrades to the water treatment facility.

March 11, 2013: CVRWD receives notification of MassDEP "Approval to Conduct Pilot Study".

March 15, 2013: District Chairman, Kevin Bergin, executes revised ACO.

March 18 - 22, 2013: Blueleaf Water, Inc. initiates final preparation and incorporation of MIEX® and GAC systems into the flow stream of the pilot slow sand filter system to begin the "Pilot Study".

March 20, 2013: Received "Authorization to Award" Construction of Media Replacement (Grindstone Well) and Resanding of Slow Sand Filter No. 2 (Henshaw Pond), Contract No. 1, DWSRF No. 3691 from the Division of Municipal Services.

March 25, 2013: CVRWD receives MassDEP executed copy of the revised ACO.

March 25, 2013: At a regularly scheduled meeting, CVRWD Board of Water Commissioners award Contract No. 2, the Construction of Media Replacement (Grindstone Well) and Resanding of Slow Sand Filter No. 2 (Henshaw Pond) to the low bidder RH White Construction Co., Inc. in the bid amount of \$237, 465.00 and further voted/executed the "Notice to Proceed".

March 26, 2013: Tata & Howard issues the Notice of Award and Notice to Proceed, Contract No. 2, the Construction of Media Replacement (Grindstone Well) and Resanding of Slow Sand Filter No. 2 (Henshaw Pond) to the low bidder RH White Construction Co., Inc. to RH White Construction, Co., Auburn, MA and requests Certification of Insurance, Bonds and Shop Drawings. RH White Construction Co. is in the process of addressing the request and developing a project schedule.

# May 1, 2014 Water Rate Increase

The Board of Water Commissioners implemented the second year of a ten year water rate increase program. In 2014 water rates will increase 30%. The ten year rate increase was presented in detail at the March 15, 2012 Public Informational Meeting.

# Annual Financial Audit

The annual financial audit was conducted by the firm of Graham and Shepherd of Worcester, MA for years ending June 30, 2011 and 2012. The audit concluded that the District continues to demonstrate excellent financial accountability.

Several notes of appreciation are in order:

# Greetings:

You are hereby directed to notify the VOTERS of the Cherry Valley and Rochdale Water District to meet in the Leicester Town Hall Auditorium, 3 Washburn Square, Leicester, Massachusetts 01524, on Thursday, the sixteenth day of May, two thousand thirteen (May 16, 2013) at seven-thirty P.M. (7:30 P.M.), then and there to act on the following articles:

- ONE: To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting and for a period of one (1) year thereafter.
- TWO: To act on the reports of the District.
- THREE: To elect the following officers by ballot:
  - A District Clerk to hold office for a period of one (1) year.A District Treasurer to hold office for a period of one (1) year.A District Commissioner to hold office for a period of three (3) years.
- FOUR: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds or free cash, or otherwise provide a sum of money, or any other sum, from any available funding source or other available means, for the operating budget for fiscal year 2014, to provide for the District's annual operating requirements, including but not limited to, salaries, related services, office expenses, maintenance, construction and any other items related thereto; to execute any instruments or documents necessary or appropriate to accomplish said purposes; or take any action in relation thereto.
- FIVE: To see if the District will raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds or free cash or otherwise provide, a sum of money, or any other sum, to create a reserve account, or take any action in relation thereto.
- SIX: To see if the District will raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds or free cash or otherwise provide, a sum of money, or any other sum as may be necessary to enable the District to fund a "Unidirectional Flushing Program" and to further pay all costs related thereto including but not limited to engineering and professional services to complete said program as mandated by the provisions set forth in the conditions of the MassDEP issued Administrative Consent Order or take any action thereto.
- SEVEN: To see if the District will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to establish a fund to receive and deposit fees paid pursuant to Chapter 105 of the Acts of 1996, and, from which expenditures may be made by the Board of Water Commissioners for legal services, administrative services and engineering services (including but not limited to, design, plan review, and inspection of the project being constructed) in connection with any water system design, review, and construction, or to take any action thereon.

- EIGHT: To see if the District will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to establish a fund to receive and deposit fees paid pursuant to Chapter 105 of the Acts Of 1996, and, from which expenditures may be made by the Board of Water Commissioners for the purchase and installation of water meters or take any action thereon.

## STATISTICS CHERRY VALLEY & ROCHDALE WATER DISTRICT

Supplying the Villages of Cherry Valley, Greenville and Rochdale, all within the Town of Leicester and extensions to Comins Road, Wells Street and Pleasant Street, all located within the Town of Oxford.

Charter (Chapter 381, Acts of 1910) accepted April 20, 1910. Charter amended May 29, 1996, Chapter 105, Act of 1996.

First Officers elected May 19, 1910.

Old systems in Cherry Valley installed by Leicester Water District in 1894 and 1895. This section was purchased in 1910 and looped into a new system.

A new system was installed in Cherry Valley in 1910. The systems in Rochdale and Greenville, plus the pumping stations and both standpipes were built in 1910.

Population supplied by the Cherry Valley and Rochdale Water District is estimated at 4,000.

Henshaw Reservoir has a storage capacity of 97,700,00 gallons and a safe yield of 375,000 gallons per day.

Grindstone Well has a safe yield of 115,000 gallons per day and was activated March 21, 2002.

Pumping to three covered standpipes. Two steel constructed tanks located in Cherry Valley with a combined capacity of 500,000 gallons. One concrete constructed tank located in Greenville with a 500,000 gallon capacity. Built on the same level and connected directly with entire system, the three standpipe system provides a total storage capacity of one million gallons.

Pipes - Main cast iron 6", 8" and 12" (16 miles)

Small pipes - Cement lined, galvanized iron and 3" cast iron.

Services - Galvanized pipe, cement lined pipe and copper tubing. (Plastic tubing not permitted).

Original construction Bonds - paid in December 1938

Pipe line construction Notes - paid in February 1939

Last District Tax Assessed - 1933

Citect SCADA System to control and monitor the operation of the Water Treatment Facility.

One 2000 Ford F150 Four-Wheel Drive Pick-up Truck.

One 2003 Ford F150 Four-Wheel Drive Dump Truck with Plow.

One Gravely Tractor with Brush Cutter and mower deck attachment.

One 1984 Smith Ridge Runner 100 cf portable air compressor.

One Pen Flow Meter, Electronic Type, which records on a 24-hour chart the time the pumps start and shut off, the exact gallons pumped per minute, plus the total gallons pumped per day.

Two Capital wall mounted Chlorinators. This is a vacuum type solution feed Chlorinator which gives a precise control of chlorine gas feed rate. (Installed in 1986)

One International Dioxide Generator System.
